At Mountainland High, we are working to prepare our students for college life and their future careers. We have worked to recruit and increase the number of students who enroll and successfully earn concurrent enrollment credits. These are college-level classes that, with good grades, hard work and dedication, help students earn college credit before graduating from high school. In fact, some of our students will graduate from high school with enough credits to be a sophomore in college! It's one thing to increase enrollment in these rigorous classes, but it's another thing entirely to provide the supports to enable students to meet the demands of college-level curriculum. However, our concurrent enrollment data indicate that this initiative is showing some success:

Enrollment in concurrent class: 2017 = 630 students; 2018 = 786 students  
That's an increase of 156 students!

Credits earned in concurrent enrollment classes: 2017 = 894; 2018 = 1,022  
That's an increase of 128 credits!

We will continue to providing engaging, rigorous college-level classes while supporting students as they learn to study and think critically at higher levels to help ensure a successful transition from high school to college.
