Thousands of workers become sick every year from overexposure to heat. Some workers have even died from heat-related illnesses

To protect yourself and your coworkers, it is important that you can recognize symptoms of heat stress

RISK FACTORS FOR HEAT-RELATED ILLNESSES

Environmental Factors:

- Hot temperature
- > High humidity
- > Sunlight
- > Air movement

Personal Factors:

- Low liquid intake
- > Physical labor
- > Clothing
- Conditioning, acclimation
- Pre-existing personal conditions

PREVENT HEAT STRESS



HOW TO CONTROL RISK FACTORS

- Air conditioning
- Fans and blowers for air movement
- Work/rest regiments
- Providing cool break areas and fluids
- Training on symptoms of heatrelated illnesses

HEAT-RELATED ILLNESSES

<u>There are four major types of</u> heat-related illnesses:

- Heat Cramps
- ➢ Heat Rash
- Heat Exhaustion
- Heat Stroke

It is important to recognize the difference between the symptoms of Heat Exhaustion and Heat Stroke.

Heat Exhaustion

- Headaches, dizziness, or fainting
- Extreme sweating, wet skin
- Irritability, confusion
- Nausea or vomiting

Heat Stroke

- Hot, dry, clammy skin
- Elevated body temperature
- Unconsciousness
- Seizures

HOW TO PROTECT YOURSELF FROM HEAT- RELATED ILLNESSES:

- 1. Drink fluids regularly and frequently.
- 2. Avoid drinking caffeine or other diuretics.
- 3. Wear natural-fiber fabrics, such as cotton.
- 4. Avoid wearing synthetic fabrics such as nylon.
- 5. When working outdoors: cover skin with loose-fitting, light-colored clothes.
- 6. Avoid wearing hats when working indoors.
- 7. Take regular rest breaks in a shaded or cool area.

Do not over stress your body in hot environments, Listen to your body and stop working if you feel any symptoms of heat related illnesses.
