- Stay Flexible & Grace-Filled No routine is perfect right away. Adjust as needed and give yourself (and your students) room to grow.

Considering Assistive Technology Where to Start

IDEA mandates IEP teams to consider assistive technology supports for students at every initial and annual IEP. In 2024, the Office of Special Education Services within the U.S. Department of Education identified that this specific aspect of IDEA was being widely neglected and issued guidance to address common misconceptions and provide additional support to IEP teams nationwide. The Jordan Utah Assistive Technology Team (UATT) reviewed that guidance and developed a tool to help teams perform this task, which can be daunting and nebulous, in a more efficient and targeted way. That tool is the JSD Assistive Technology Consideration and Resource Guide. The guide provides examples of standard classroom materials, accommodations, modifications, instructional strategies, and assistive technology supports that can be used to support various academic skills and tasks.
