**Bio:** Dr. Christian Sabey got his start in education working as a paraprofessional in a self-contained class for students with emotional and behavior disorders. It was in that setting that he discovered a love for behavior management and for students with challenging behavior. Since his start as a paraprofessional, Christian has worked as an afterschool group leader, a summer school director, a dean of students, a school psychologist, a behavior specialist and more. He has worked in education at the school, district, and state levels.

For Christian, this work is personal. He is a product of the Special Education system (Ms. Remples 2nd grade remedial reading class). He has worked in the education system with a broad range of students from high performing students to students with severe challenges. Most recently, Christian has experienced Special Education from the perspective of a parent, as he has two children with Down Syndrome who receive special education services. He intimately understands the need for all students to experience belonging and success at school and home.

He earned a Masters degree in School Psychology and a Doctoral degree in Special Education with an emphasis in Applied Behavior Analysis and is currently a Board Certified Behavior Analyst (BCBA) and a Licensed Behavior Analyst (LBA) in the state of Utah.

By day, he works as an assistant professor of Special Education at Brigham Young University, where he teaches preservice teachers how to manage challenging behavior and does research on how to help school personnel to support tough kids. By night, Christian is a husband and father of four.
